FRIENDLY REMINDERS

- Renter's Insurance Policy Reminder: If you are rated to fly the aircraft, please remember that a renter's insurance policy is mandatory. We cannot dispatch the aircraft unless the policy is on file. This requirement also extends to safety pilots and any buddies you take flying. If they touch the controls, they must have insurance. Remember, as per your rental agreement, you are the Pilot in Command (PIC) at all times. Please ensure you adhere to these guidelines to maintain safety and compliance.
- **Reservation Changes:** If you need to cancel or adjust your reservation, please contact the office by phone or email. As our staff members occasionally take random days off, it's important not to contact them directly to ensure your changes are properly managed.
- **Door Safety:** Please ensure that all aircraft doors are securely closed when not in use, even when you're just moving the planes around. During pre-flight checks, keep the doors closed as well. We've been experiencing too many door-related issues that could easily be avoided by simply shutting the door when it's not in use.
- **Weather Briefing:** Always get a full weather briefing before your flight. As the saying goes, "It's better to be on the ground wishing you were in the air than in the air wishing you were on the ground." Contact a weather briefer at 1-800-WXBrief and discuss your flight plans thoroughly. Don't push the limits. While it's important to learn how to navigate Northern Nevada's conditions, if you find yourself as the only plane in the sky that day, you might not have fully assessed the weather. Stay safe and make wise decisions—there's no room for ego in flying.


