TRAFFIC! TRAFFIC!

You've all been there. The all too familiar "non-towered airport". These important airports in our national system often get referred to as "uncontrolled" airport but remember they are anything but. True, there won't be a tower controller telling you what to do as you get set up for landing but they are, certainly, controlled - by you and the other pilots that use them!

Remember that the best practice of when to make your first call up to a non-towered airport is when ten miles out. That call can simply be something along the lines of "XYZ traffic, Skyhawk, 1234, ten miles to the west, 7,500, to land XYZ." Before that first call, you should have already listened to the AWOS and have a good idea ofd what runway you'll be using. It's also smart to listen to traffic and determine what runway they are using then follow the leader. As you get closer, make another call at five miles with your position again and, this time, add how you intend to enter the pattern. "Will enter on the 45 to left downwind runway 08" or "will overfly midfield and enter right downwind for 26". You know the drill. Then, at about 2-3 miles, start making the standard pattern calls – downwind, base, final.

Two important things to consider, also. Here, we often are on with ATC until less than ten miles from our destination. No big deal. Just make the calls as soon as you are able. Just remember, when you can make the calls early, it's best to do so. The other thing is to talk with other pilots in the pattern! No, it isn't necessary to ask what they had for breakfast, but think about how tower controllers at KRNO notify you of traffic here. At non-towered airports, it is very helpful to let other traffic know you do or do not have them in sight. Rely on your eyes out the window, not your technology. Remember that at non-towered airports, not everyone has ADSB or even a radio!

Take the time to practice smooth entry and exit from non-towered traffic patterns. Review Chapter 8 in the Airplane Flying Handbook for the long and detailed version of airport traffic patterns!

REMINDERS FOR THE UPCOMING WEEK

- Watch for wing covers and frost. DO NOT put the flaps down with the wing covers on.
- In the event of frost formation on your aircraft, you and your CFI will be put to work in helping remove it. Please make sure you have a line technician or a CFI helping you with frost removal. Teamwork is crucial here!
- Please pay attention to your parking at the end of the day. A parking map will be posted on top of the locker. If you have questions interpreting the map, please let me know and I'll answer your questions.
- Please report any anomalies before flying and any issues or damage immediately after the flight to ensure safety and airworthiness.
