TAXI SPEEDS AND HOLDING SHORT - TIPS FOR PRESERVING TIRES

As part of our commitment to safety and professionalism, we want to address some important guidelines regarding taxi speeds and holding short for takeoff. Adhering to these practices not only ensures a smoother operation but also helps in preserving our aircraft tires.

- Taxi Speeds When taxiing, it's crucial to maintain a controlled and steady speed. Excessive speeds can lead to unnecessary wear and tear on our tires, increasing maintenance costs and reducing the lifespan of the tires. Aim to taxi at a speed that allows you to stop the aircraft promptly if needed. This typically means a brisk walking pace, which gives you enough control to navigate turns and avoid sudden stops.
- Holding Short for Takeoff When approaching the hold short line, slow down well in advance. This
 helps in preventing abrupt stops and reduces the strain on the brakes and tires. Gradually bring the
 aircraft to a complete stop at the hold short line, ensuring you are clear of the runway and in
 compliance with ATC instructions.
- Avoid Riding the Brakes One common issue we've observed is pilots riding the brakes during taxi. This practice can cause significant wear on the brake system and tires. Instead, manage your speed with throttle control, allowing the aircraft to slow down naturally. Only use the brakes when necessary to bring the aircraft to a complete stop.
- Preserve the Tires Tire maintenance is a critical aspect of flight operations. By adhering to proper taxi speeds and braking techniques, we can significantly extend the life of our tires. This not only reduces maintenance costs but also ensures the safety and reliability of our fleet.
- Remember, Others Are Watching As pilots of Great Basin Aviation, it's important to remember that others are always watching.
