UNDERSTANDING HOT SPOTS ON AIRPORT DIAGRAMS: A CRUCIAL SAFETY SKILL

As pilots, safety and awareness are paramount, and knowing how to identify hot spots on airport diagrams is crucial, even if KRNO doesn't have them.

What is a Hot Spot?

A hot spot is an area on an airport where there's an increased risk of collisions or runway incursions. These areas often have complex layouts or high traffic volumes.

Why Are Hot Spots Important?

Hot spots alert pilots to areas needing extra attention, helping prevent accidents. Being aware of them enhances situational awareness and ensures safe navigation.

Identifying Hot Spots

- 1. Symbol: Look for a circled or boxed HS (Hot Spot) symbol on airport diagrams.
- 2. Label: Hot spots are labeled with identifiers like HS 1, HS 2, etc.
- 3. Location: They are marked at critical areas, like taxiway intersections.

Practicing Awareness

Even though KRNO does not have hot spots, you can practice by reviewing diagrams of busier airports. Note the hot spots and their descriptions to stay prepared and safety-conscious.

Understanding hot spots helps maintain safety during ground operations. Stay vigilant, keep learning, and prioritize safety in every phase of flight. Reach out to your instructor or GBA staff if you have questions regarding hot spots. Fly safe and stay sharp!
