IT'S HOT! LET'S TALK HEAT RESTRICTIONS AND PERFORMANCE (OURS & THE PLANE'S)

Summer is in full swing, and so is the heat. As temperatures soar, it's not just you who's sweating, your trusty Cessna 172 is feeling it too.

Let's break it down:

High heat = high density altitude = less performance. That means longer takeoff rolls, reduced climb rates, and less engine efficiency. Your airplane doesn't love hot, thin air any more than you love pre-flighting in 100 degrees. On the ground and in the air, things just get... sluggish. That's why we monitor heat restrictions so closely at GBA. When temps climb, we may delay flights, adjust weights, or limit dual operations in the afternoon. It's not just for the aircraft, it's for you and your CFI's health and safety too. Heat exhaustion is real, and the ramp can feel like an oven by 1 p.m.

Pro tips to beat the heat (and fly safely):

- Hydrate like it's your job.
- Plan morning flights when temps and DA are lower.
- Don't rush, hot, tired pilots make mistakes.

Know your aircraft's performance numbers, and brief the density altitude before every flight. Flying in the heat teaches us flexibility, awareness, and smart decision-making. So keep that water bottle close, your performance charts closer, and don't hesitate to reschedule if the temps push limits.

Stay cool, fly safe, and may your takeoff roll be short (but your checklist thorough).
