## USE THE TAXI DIAGRAM — YOUR FUTURE SELF (AND ATC) WILL THANK YOU

Spring 2026 will be here before we know it. Get ready for changes to taxiway designations at KRNO and other airports nationwide. That's right, those trusty taxiways you've memorized might be getting renamed, rerouted, or relabeled. So what does that mean for you?

It means it's time to get cozy with your taxi diagram. Now. Not later. Not "when it changes." Now. Whether you're just starting out or you've been flying patterns in your sleep, the Law of Primacy applies: what you learn first tends to stick. And if what you've learned is to taxi without referencing the diagram, well, that's a habit worth breaking.

#### Here's the thing:

- Taxi clearances aren't suggestions
- · The airport diagram isn't optional
- · "I think it's this way" is not situational awareness

Start treating every taxi like it's your checkride. Review the diagram before you call ground. Trace your route. Look at hold short lines, hotspots, and changes. Don't be the person fumbling to find the diagram after missing a turn at Alpha 4 (or another new taxiway name). Be the person who's already briefed, confident, and ready to roll (literally).

So, the next time your instructor says, "Use the diagram," don't take it personally, take it professionally. Study it now, use it always, and thank yourself late
