FROM "DAWN PATROL ONLY" TO ALL-DAY AVIATOR

All summer we front-load the schedule at sunrise and shut it down by lunch. In July, that's smart: heat, density altitude, and convective bumps make afternoons a grind. But fall changes the air and the workload.

Afternoons start to stabilize. Cooler temps bring better climb rates and shorter takeoff rolls. The pattern thins, radios calm down, and winds trend steadier instead of gusty. You go up at 7500 "just to see" and find workable crosswinds, manageable bumps, and a smoother lesson block than you expected.

Late day brings practical advantages, too. Visibility improves as the sun drops, traffic eases, and you can sequence longer tasks, XC planning, holds, checkride profiles, without fighting the noon rush. And as sunset moves earlier, night currency fits into a normal evening instead of a midnight ordeal.

Keep your dawn patrol if you love it, but don't lock yourself to it. This season, Nevada gives you solid flying from sun-up to sun-down (and a bit beyond). Use the whole day, book a mid-afternoon or golden-hour flight and let the conditions work for you. It's not about avoiding early alarms; it's about flying when the air is ready to help.




